

Dear Valued LREC Member,

LREC wrapped up fiscal year 2024 (FY 2024) maintaining a healthy financial position. We had 1% higher energy sales compared to 2023 and 5% lower than projections. Additional sales did not generate adequate revenues to cover all the operating expenses of the cooperative. LREC ended the year with an operating loss of \$4,257,638. However, the addition of the non-operating revenues enabled us to end the year with \$122,227 in total margins.

In December of 2024 the board approved a patronage capital retirement/refund of \$1,224,939 to the members, bringing the total funds refunded to the members to \$29,966,196.


